
His design takes inspiration from the ascetic of the Indianapolis and Chicago flag. Indiana's torch of enlightenment symbolizes our Hoosier heritage and our desire to embrace advancement with our various colleges. The royal blue represents the Wabash River our city was founded on and stands as a color symbolizing unity embracing how our town comes together. The white represents harmony and the gold the prosperity of our city and the excellence of the hard working men, women, and children in our community!





I cleaned up this design a bit, removing the minute detail in the Sycamore leaf. I also adjusted the orientation of the leaf to point more towards the center of the flag rather than to the outside. I cleaned up the "river" element and substituted "Terre Haute" for Indiana in the torch. I experimented with other significant elements, but found that they just cluttered the image. Keeping it simple I'm still representing the conceived design presented by Mr. Ronald Goetz and accepted by the Terre Haute City Council in 1976. Although the description of Mr. Goetz' design stipulated a white flag background, I felt that the torch logo is better served on a blue field. The light blue rippled diagonal represents the Wabash River while the orange and yellow Sycamore leaf rests on its bank. There are a lot of well-conceived designs already presented on this page. My intent was to try to represent Ronald Goetz application, as best I could given limited information.

Paying homage to the winner of the first Terre Haute city flag contest, and a design concept adopted by the City Council in May 1976, which was never actually produced, my respects to Ronald Goetz with these three designs. The first two reflect the Wabash River with the Sycamore leaf and the torch and stars logo. Design three refers to the Crossroads of America. All three use the blue and gold Indiana colors while the third one utilizes red, white and blue to complete the "Crossroads of America" symbolism.






High ground - Wabash River - four universities



The blue wave represents the Wabash River. It is surrounded by green on both sides, representing the prosperity of the banks. A 12-pointed star represents the bright future of the city and pays homage to the 12 Points neighborhood. The white background represents peace.

The colors used in the river and the star are the same shades used on the Indiana state flag, so they would ideally look harmonious when displayed together. I'm open to changing the green shade, this was just what I thought looked nice.

Both feature a sycamore leaf to symbolize the sycamores Terre Haute is known for. The 19 stars represent Indiana's place as the 19th state.

Gold and blue to mimic Indiana's colors, but to also represent the Wabash River and the prosperity it brought our town in the beginning, gold also representing quality, wealth, and good fortunes. Blue is also the color of trustworthiness. White is a color of hope, openness, and new beginnings, which we all wish for our community.

The diagonal lines represent the Crossroads of America, on which we were built.

My goal was a simple, easy to reproduce flag that could be used in a myriad of sizes and uses with no loss to quality.




Ellie Rippy








The blue represents the river. The wheel represents the crossroads, and the laurel represents education. The wheel also represents our trains, highlighting our role as a center for both culture and industry





The flag of the City of Terre Haute, Indiana, features symbolic elements that represent its unique heritage and significance. The iconic sycamore leaf, symbolizing the majestic sycamores lining the Wabash River, takes center stage. The blue backdrop mirrors the presence of the Wabash River, while the color white is emblematic of hope and prosperity.

A white circle and Cross take prominence, serving as symbols of the Crossroads of America upon which the town was founded. This design element pays homage to the historical significance of Terre Haute as a vital crossroads. Additionally, fleurs-de-lis adorn the flag, a nod to the French influence on the region. The French were the first to claim this area, known as Terre Haute (High Ground) or Haute-Louisiane (Upper Louisiana). Together, these elements come together to tell the story of Terre Haute's rich history and cultural tapestry.
