Public Safety Radios

UPGRADE IN RADIO COMMUNICATIONS

- Dependent communication becoming more imperative since pandemic.
- Existing radios approaching end of lifetime
- Parts difficult to acquire/repair.

NEWER TECHNOLOGY-BASED RADIOS

- Best level communication fluency.
- Additional safety measures for city employees and public.
- Includes Terre Haute Police Department, Terre Haute Fire Department, and all other City services.



INFRASTRUCTURE

13th and 8th Avenue Storm and Waste Water Project

\$3.5 MILLION

This project is part of the Railroad Overpass Project at this location. The funds would be used to provide a significant portion of our total match and cover the cost of the relocation of existing sanitary and storm water infrastructure necessary to build the overpass.

Brown Avenue Storm Water Project

\$2 MILLION

This project is part of our LTCP and would provide storm water collection on Brown Avenue (north and south of Hulman Street) that would then drain to the Hulman Street Storm water pipe (project completed in 2009) and then into Thompson Ditch.

PUBLIC SPACES

City Hall Upgrade (Phase 1)

\$4 MILLION

City Hall is showing its age but is a statement piece and historical building in our community. Several city departments reside within the building along with the Mayor, City Court, City Clerk and the City Council chambers.

UPGRADES FOR THIS PORTION (INTERIOR)

- Complete electrical and HVAC upgrades.
- Upgraded floors and paint.

\$500,000

FOOD DESERTS

Food Deserts

\$500,000

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These funds will go towards grant programs to help stabilize the food banks and meal sites after the additional hardships they felt and reacted to during/through the pandemic.



DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT

Road which opened Highway 41, d settlement, and U.S. Highway 41, d major north-south route, were major north-south route, were designated part of the original designated part of the original federal highway system in 1926. Their intersection in Terre Haute at Wabash Avenue and Seventh Street became the "Crossroads of America."

FEDERAL

Hotel Parking Garage & Downtown PRAFT Tourism Projects

\$4 MILLION

The hotel/parking garage project is a staple for the Terre Haute Convention Center's success moving forward. Additional hotel rooms, parking, and entertainment is needed to compete in the convention industry.

Additional investments in tourism related projects and wayfinding are essential to supporting downtown's continued growth.

HUMANE SOCIETY



Terre Haute / Vigo County T Humane Shelter

\$250,000

The City of Terre Haute contracts with the TH Humane Shelter to provide resources to assist Code Enforcement and residents with stray animals. The organization plans to develop an onsite clinic that will provide low-cost basic medical services for animals and a regular low or no cost spay and neuter program. In addition, a dedicated space will add a go-to clinic for code enforcement to use.
