


# FROM THE OFFICE OF THE MAYOR

"Summer has kicked off in full swing here in Terre Haute. In May we saw the return of a legend, with the opening of the Larry Bird Museum. We kicked off several construction projects and began paving across the city. This month two goals are beginning the process of redeveloping the old police station on Wabash and finalizing demolition on over 20 residential structures on the condemned property list. We continue to focus on addressing blight in an effort to revitalize and reimagine our city.

THE MAYORS YOUTH COUNCIL

This project is one of two expected to deliver a significant multi-million-dollar investment, positively impacting downtown Terre Haute and the surrounding area. In April, the Redevelopment Commission approved the release of a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the Downtown Hotel Project, located at the northwest corner of 7th Street and Wabash Avenue. In June, the Commission will open and review the submitted proposals. The successful proposal will be selected during the July Redevelopment Commission meeting, with site development to commence shortly thereafter.

# 12th & Wabash Police Department Building Demolition

This project is one of two expected to deliver a significant multi-million-dollar investment, positively impacting downtown Terre Haute and the surrounding area. An Invitation to Bid for the demolition of the building is expected to be advertised in June. Mayor Sakbun and the Department of Redevelopment have prioritized converting this property from an unsightly, underutilized space into a productive community asset. A Request for Proposals (RFP) seeking a multi-use facility will soon be released by the Redevelopment Commission.

# <u>SWA-2P(R): Seabury Avenue – 11th Street to 13th Street</u>

This project involves the comprehensive removal of existing pavement, curbs, drive approaches, trees, stumps, and sidewalks, followed by the construction of new pavement, curbs and gutters, sidewalks, ADA ramps, driveways, a new storm sewer system, tree planting, signage, pavement markings, and seeding within the project area.

The project will be entirely funded through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program, utilizing Federal funds. The work performed under this contract is part of a project receiving direct Federal financial assistance from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

#### **EPA Brownfields**

Phase 1 and Phase 2 assessments are ongoing at several brownfield sites within Terre Haute. The primary focus of the EPA's Brownfields Program is the identification, assessment, and remediation of these sites. Transforming brownfields into greenfields benefits the entire community. The Department of Redevelopment is dedicated to creating a cleaner environment for everyone to live, work, and play. As Round 2 of the Brownfields grants concludes, expect a significantly increased emphasis on remediation in Round 3.

## <u>Housing</u>

New home development in the City of Terre Haute has nearly tripled in the past year! Mayor Sakbun and the Department of Redevelopment are committed to addressing the housing shortage that our community, like many others, is facing. With several large employers planning to establish operations in Terre Haute and Vigo County, significant new home development efforts will continue.

Mayor Sakbun announces the development of The Mayor's Youth Council. He will be working with the Vigo County School Corporation to select a group of 2024/2025 high school seniors. These students will have an immersive experience in local government.

The Department of Redevelopment recently received a substantial number of parcels from the county. Title work on these properties is ongoing, with the ultimate goal of developing new homes on these sites.

 Mullen Flats, a 42-unit supportive housing and taxcredit development providing housing for chronically homeless individuals, is currently under construction. Heritage Landing, a 46-unit senior housing facility, is expected to begin construction in Fall 2024.

## **MISSED MINGLE WITH THE MAYOR?**

Read the updates Mayor Brandon provided.

#### Park Improvements

- Rea Park: Construction of a temporary clubhouse is underway. The temporary facility will host the First Tee Indiana golf program for kids.
- Herz-Rose Park: On schedule with the support of ARPA funds, aiming to bid in June and select a contractor in July.
- Dobbs Park Pond: Unable to add catfish to the pond.
- Master Plans: Ongoing development of five-year master plans for parks to guide budget decisions and keep the community informed.

#### **Community Amenities**

- Study: Ongoing study to design a pool and sports complex, with exploration of long-term funding options.
- Funding: CIB bonds available up to \$3.5 million. Initial funding from the States Ready Program was not as expected, prompting discussions with the private sector. Updates expected by August.

### Boys and Girls Club (Chauncey Rose Property)

• Jurisdiction: Decisions are in the hands of the board and school corporation. The city does not have jurisdiction over this matter.

#### North 19th and Beech St. Factory

• EPA Involvement: The EPA is conducting contamination tests to determine eligibility for emergency cleanup.

#### Indiana State University Projects

- **Projects**: Two construction projects, including a year-long renovation of the Technology Building along Cherry and 6th St.
- Impact: Expect congestion on Cherry St. during the renovation period.

#### East Side Infrastructure

- **Upcoming Work**: Installation of flashing stop signs at Fruitridge and Margaret.
- Future Plans: Collaboration with engineering firms to start construction next year, connecting New Margaret with Margaret to improve traffic flow and increase residential development.

# TRASH ORDINANCE UPDATE FOR THE TERRE HAUTE SANITARY DISTRICT

The fee for the cost of "Waste and Refuse Collection and Removal for Residential Customers" is your monthly trash fee for your trash service.

Since 2019, the rate has been \$11.00. Beginning on July 1, 2024 this rate will increase. Each year, the rate will resume increasing ~3.3% as it did in the past. The rates will be evaluated every 3 years.

IF YOU ARE; Over 65, blind or disabled, a disabled veteran or a surviving spouse, and have filed and been granted a deduction on your property taxes by the County Auditor, you are eligible for a 33% monthly credit/discount on your bill.

July 1st, 2019	\$11.00 per month
July 1st, 2024	\$15.00 per month
July 1st, 2025	\$15.50 per month
July 1st, 2026	\$16.00 per month

### With Available Credit Homeowner

July 1st, 2019	\$8.25 per month
July 1st, 2024	\$10.05 per month
July 1st, 2025	\$10.38 per month
July 1st, 2026	\$10.72 per month

The recycling rebate that is offered to city residents will be increased from 25% to 50%.


